It is the entrant's responsibility to check all details before submitting and paying for their entry.

No corrections, section changes, or refunds will be permitted once entries have closed.

The Eisteddfod Association does NOT review or amend entries—the accuracy of all information, including name, age, and sections entered, is solely the responsibility of the competitor.

We welcome donations toward trophies and prize money, as these generous contributions make our event possible. Payments may be made through your Comps Online entry or via bank deposit, EFTPOS, or cash at the Mackay Eisteddfod Office.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

NOTE: Entrants are responsible for reviewing the specific rules and regulations that apply to each individual art form, in addition to these general conditions.

- 1** This competition is open to amateurs only. An 'amateur' is defined as someone whose primary source of income is not earned through performing the talent required for any section they enter. This restriction does not apply to conductors or accompanists.
- 2** For all sections where an age limit applies, a competitor's age as of 1 January 2026 will be taken as their official age for the competition (except Highland Dancing where the age is taken as at the date of the competition).
- 3** All entries for Duets, Duos, Trios, and Quartets must include the names of all competitors; incomplete entries will not be accepted. For Duets/Duos and Trios, all competitors must be no older than the specified age.
- 4** Solo competitors must compete under the name used at the time of online entry. Entrants are responsible for checking the accuracy of their Comps Online invoice, as no changes will be accepted after entries close on 14 July 2026. For Duets/Duos, Trios, and Quartets, a partner may be substituted only at the discretion of the committee and only for a valid reason. Applications for substitutions must be submitted by 18 August 2026 (prior to publication of the program). Applications received after this date may be approved; however, the competitors will not be eligible for a mark or placing.
- 5** In solo sections, to be eligible to compete in a higher or open age group section the competitor must compete in the same section in his/her own age group (where applicable). Where an age group is specified, only competitors of that age will be eligible to compete. THIS DOES NOT APPLY TO DANCE OR SPEECH & DRAMA SECTIONS.
- 6** Competitors may submit only one entry per section. This rule also applies to entries in groups, duets/duos, trios, and quartets, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
- 7** Entries must be submitted via Comps Online www.compsonline.com.au
Please ensure all details entered are correct—including name, age, sections entered, email/postal address, contact phone number, and any section sponsorships or trophy donations. The Comps Online invoice issued after payment serves as your Confirmation of Entry, and no corrections will be permitted after entries close.

- 8** Entrants must appear in their section in the order listed in the program or forfeit their right to perform, except where clashes between art forms occur and prior arrangements have been made with a committee member at the Eisteddfod Office. Competitors may not transfer to another sub-section when a section has been divided into A, B, etc.
- 9** Competitors who do not intend to participate in a section for which they have entered should notify the Eisteddfod Office before the scheduled time of that section.
- 10** No teacher or parent will be allowed on stage during a performance unless they are an accompanist or conductor.
- 11** An adjudication critique will be provided for all sections except Highland and Irish Dancing. Depending on the art form, critiques will be delivered either as an audio recording or as a hard-copy document available from the Eisteddfod Office.
- 12** Prompting is not permitted in any section; competitors who are prompted will be disqualified. No unauthorized individuals may stand in the wings during a performance.
- 13** Communication with Adjudicators is strictly prohibited. If it is established that any competitor or unauthorised person has been in contact with an Adjudicator during the course of the Eisteddfod, the Committee reserves the right to disqualify that competitor.
- 14** Competitors must not have received tuition from any Adjudicator within six months prior to the commencement of the Eisteddfod.
- 15** Competitors may be disqualified if they do not adhere to the time limits set for their section. Where a time limit applies, a bell will signal that the limit has been exceeded, and the competitor must stop performing immediately.
- 16** Any item, or any part thereof, must not be performed more than once in the same artform by the same competitor during the Eisteddfod (excluding Highland and Irish Dancing).
- 17** Aggregate trophy winners will be determined by a points system. For each section, points will be awarded as follows: First place – 10 points; Second – 7 points; Third – 5 points; Fourth – 3 points; Fifth – 2 points; Sixth – 1 point.
Exceptions:
 - 1) In Primary and Secondary Choral Choir Championships the Adjudicator's actual marks will be totalled.
 - 2) In Highland Dancing sections, the R.S.O.B.H.D. scrutineering system will be used.
- 18** Competitors compete at their own risk.
- 19** The Committee reserves the right to refuse any Eisteddfod entry and to alter the program order without prior notice.
- 20** The Committee reserves the right to cancel, combine, or subdivide sections based on the number of entries received.
- 21** No protest regarding a competitor's eligibility to compete will be accepted unless submitted in writing to the Eisteddfod Office—either on paper or via email (office@mackayeisteddfod.org)—prior to the commencement of the Eisteddfod, and accompanied by a fee of \$20.00. All other protests or disputed matters must be submitted in writing within half an hour of the issue arising, also accompanied by a fee of \$20.00. In all cases, the fee will be forfeited if the protest or dispute is deemed frivolous.

- 22** First, Second, Third, and Highly Commended placings will be awarded in all sections, except for Choral and Vocal Primary Group Sections, where Gold, Silver, and Bronze awards are given. The Adjudicator reserves the right to withhold any prize if they consider the standard of performance insufficient.
- 23** The Eisteddfod Committee accepts no liability for any copyright infringement arising from the submission of digital or paper copies. Entrants submit all copies and works at their own risk. All photocopies provided for the Adjudicator's use will be destroyed at the conclusion of the section. One Music forms must be submitted with all music copies.
- 24** **The use of mobile phones, recording devices, video equipment, and cameras by the audience is prohibited**, as capturing images of performers under 18 may constitute an offence. The Eisteddfod Committee reserves the right to photograph, record, film, broadcast, or upload to our website or Facebook page any item or section of the Eisteddfod. Competitors' names and/or photographs may be published by the official photographer or the Eisteddfod Committee. If this is not appropriate, the Eisteddfod Office **must be** notified in writing prior to the commencement of the Eisteddfod.
- 25** Every competitor has the right to feel safe at our event. **It is strictly prohibited to repost or distribute any official or unofficial recording, photograph, or message to any social platform or to multiple recipients with the intent to menace, harass, intimidate, ridicule, or humiliate a competitor.** Such behaviour will result in immediate disqualification from the current competition, with possible exclusion from future events at the discretion of the Executive. All such matters may be reported to police, in consultation with the targeted person.
- 26** Only competitors and designated teachers or studio/school representatives are permitted backstage.
- 27** No competitor is permitted to have a mobile phone or any other mobile device side stage. This rule applies to all competitors across all art forms.
- 28** No competitor may use the stage at any time without the permission of the Stage Manager.
- 29** The Committee is unable to make special arrangements for any competitor (including those travelling from out of town) to appear at a time other than as programmed, except in cases where clashes between art forms occur—refer to point 8 above.
- 30** A high standard of decorum is expected from all participants and spectators. Unseemly behaviour will result in offenders being asked to leave, and offending competitors may be disqualified. In the event that property is damaged in any way, the offenders will be charged accordingly.
- 31** **The decision of the Committee shall be final and binding in all matters relating to the interpretation of the Rules and Conditions of the Eisteddfod.**

Own Choice Submissions 2026

Please read these rules carefully

- Own Choice Speech and Drama pieces must be lodged electronically via Music Uploads.
- Own Choice submission will open in the weeks leading up to the Eisteddfod, and all material must be uploaded to Music Uploads by the nominated cut-off date. All relevant information, including all dates will be emailed to competitors.
- Own Choice material will not be accepted after the nominated cut-off date.
- Own Choice material which is not submitted by the cut-off date will result in the competitor being disqualified. The competitor may still perform and obtain an adjudication sheet but will not receive a mark or placing.
- Own Choice material is to be typed, with the section number, section title, competitor number and competitor name clearly marked at the top of the page.
- The author/copyright holder of the work to be performed must be acknowledged at the beginning or end of the work.
- Scripts with “Author Unknown” are acceptable for most sections, however they are **not** accepted for Verse by an Australian Author or for Period Drama sections. ie for Sections 423, 429, 435, 441, 447, 454, the poet/playwright/author must be clearly marked.
- Any scripts from a play are also required to state the name of the play in addition to the author.

SPEECH AND DRAMA – RULES AND CONDITIONS

PLEASE ALSO REFER TO GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. Solo competitors must compete in their applicable age-specific sections.
2. All Speech and Drama performances (excluding Prepared/Impromptu Reading Sections) are to be from memory.
3. Entrants must appear in their section in program order, or forfeit their right to perform, except where clashes between artforms occur, and prior arrangement has been made with a committee member at the Eisteddfod Office.
4. Where a large number of competitors dictates that any Section needs to be split into sub-sections, A, B, C etc, competitors will not be allowed to change to another sub-section.
5. No prompting shall be permitted from the audience or side stage. Competitors who are prompted by a person other than the adjudicator will be disqualified, and the person prompting will be asked to leave. No prompting shall be permitted from the wings of the theatre for groups.
6. If performances exceed time limits, points may be deducted or the competitor disqualified at the adjudicator's discretion.
7. Material being presented should be age appropriate and suitable for viewing by audiences of all ages. Please note that material containing unacceptable profanity or is based around themes of a highly sensitive nature such as abuse, violence, suicide or similar traumatic events are to be avoided because the committee is not in a position to provide appropriate and timely content warnings to its audiences. All submitted scripts shall be vetted, and where the adjudicator or committee have identified an item to be unsuitable for the age/section, or to contain sensitive topics that are inappropriate for general audience viewing, the competitor shall be disqualified, and that item shall not be permitted to be performed at any future Mackay Eisteddfod. If competitors are uncertain whether their material is acceptable, they can email their script to the committee for vetting before the nominated upload period.
8. Competitors are not permitted to perform an item or part thereof which they have performed during the previous year's Eisteddfod. This includes Drama and Music Theatre Groups, where the competitor is deemed to be the studio or group they are performing under. Choral Speaking groups are excluded from this rule (ie Sections 474 to 483.)
9. Any item or part thereof must not be performed more than once in the same Artform by the same competitor during the Eisteddfod.
10. No member of a duologue or group will be permitted to perform with another duologue or group in the same section. (In the duologue sections all the details of both performers must appear on the entry form).
11. Duologue partners may be from different age groups; however, the competitors must perform in the age group of the elder student.
12. No parent or teacher will be allowed on stage with a competitor during a performance unless as a Conductor.
13. No sand, liquid, powder, glitter, straw, glass, or dangerous props will be permitted. Props requiring electrical power are *not* permitted. Flames are *not* permitted. Aerosol cans being used as props are *not* permitted to be sprayed. If food is to be used as a prop, it *must* remain in a sealed container or remain as a single unbroken/whole entity. If you are unsure whether your props comply with these rules, please confirm with the committee before the commencement of the eisteddfod. Props which do not comply with these requirements will not be permitted on stage, or if they are observed on stage, the competitor shall face disqualification.

14. Lighting requirements for Musical Theatre Groups, Dramatic Excerpt Groups and Group Mime sections should be discussed with the Stage Manager prior to the commencement of the relevant section. Lighting/Sound/Stage options for these sections are outlined on the final page of this schedule.
15. The Committee considers it highly unethical for a teacher or student to copy the work of another teacher or student particularly in regard to original work of a teacher or student.
16. In all Dramatic Excerpt and Musical Theatre Sections, five minutes will be allowed for setting the stage and five minutes allowed for striking the stage.
17. In Sections **474 – 482** group members must be students of the same Primary or Secondary School.
18. Where the number of voices is stated, the number must be strictly adhered to, otherwise the group will be disqualified. No interchange of choir members will be allowed during Section competition.
19. No member of one choir will be permitted to perform with another choir in the same Section.
20. Choirs will appear in order determined by ballot before the official program is printed and the order of appearance shall be as printed in the program.
21. Music/backing tracks are *not* permitted in any sections for Speech & Drama solos and duologues. Music/backing tracks *are* permitted for Dramatic Excerpt groups and Music Theatre Excerpt Groups, but they are *not* permitted for Choral Speaking or Mime Groups.
22. The following sections are *not* permitted to have full costumes or any sets/scenery – Verse Recitation, Verse by an Australian Author, Humorous Verse, Prepared Reading. These sections are to have minimal movement only and may be accompanied by a single accessory or handheld prop.
23. For mime sections, competitors must wear theatre blacks. Allowable props are blocks and chairs only. Please note that mime SOLO sections must have a maximum total of 4 blocks/chairs.
24. In Verse Recitation Sections **403, 407, 411, 415, 419** pieces are to be of a serious nature. Material that is of a humorous nature may have points deducted or be disqualified.
25. Slam poetry and dub poetry are not permitted in any Sections. Please refer to the following definitions and guidelines:

Definition of Spoken Word/SLAM and Dub Poetry:

Spoken Word/SLAM poetry has a form with no specific rhyming scheme/pattern or poetic structure. They are written with the aim of being ‘performed’ live rather than being published in written form and typically address political and social issues. For example, poetry written by Anisa Nandaula, Warsan Shire and Ruby Francisco are considered to be Spoken Word/SLAM poems.

Dub poetry is a type of Spoken Word performance poetry of Jamaican origin, which evolved from dub & reggae music (and is often performed to instrumental music of this style).

Information regarding Group Speaking Choirs for Schools Sections

Schools will need to email the number of students performing in the choir - please include staff in those numbers. These numbers shall be used for the allocated seating requirements in the auditorium. If more than four staff are required to accompany a choir, please contact the Eisteddfod Committee.

Finalised choir numbers will need to be emailed to office@mackayeisteddfod.org early in September. Schools will be notified of the date that this is due.

Performances in the Theatre

If you are performing in the theatre, you are required to register for your section with the Stage Manager. Arrive early and register your competitor number with the Stage Manager at least 15 minutes before your section begins. Be prepared to answer any questions about your performance, e.g. will you be starting on or off-stage? Will you finish by leaving the stage? What props do you require?

Once you have registered, please wait in the nominated area, as directed by the Stage Manager or marshal. If you are not present when you are called to the stage, you may miss your chance to perform. If you are waiting backstage, please be quiet as any noise backstage can be heard by the audience and may disrupt the person performing onstage. Persons making too much noise sidestage will be asked to leave and may therefore miss their opportunity to perform onstage.

All persons are required to wear closed shoes in all MECC dressing rooms, Green Room, backstage areas/hallways and stage – except for performers who are dressed in their stage costume/outfit.

Performances in the Space

When you arrive, you will be required to register for your solo or duo section. Please register with the marshal outside the Green Room and provide any additional information such as title and whether you start on/off stage.

For performances requiring costume changes, the Green Room will be available for competitors to change costumes. Please note that makeup is only allowed in the smaller dressing rooms within the Green Room (ie no makeup in the main area of the Green Room). Due to limited space, performers should arrive with hair and makeup already done, where possible.

Once a competitor is dressed for their section, they will be marshalled in the hallway outside the Green Room and lined up as per the order in the program. This is where the competitor will normally wait during their section while waiting to perform, and they will enter the stage from this hallway. Competitors may alternatively sit in the audience with their parents/teacher during their section and enter the stage directly from the audience – however if this is the case, then the competitor must inform the marshal on duty and purchase a ticket to sit in the audience. Speech and Drama teachers will be permitted to wait with their students during a section.

All persons are required to wear closed shoes in all MECC dressing rooms, Green Room, backstage areas/hallways and stage – except for performers who are dressed in their stage costume/outfit.

Rules for use of Green Room

- Privacy screens will be erected in the Green Room to designate the area for Eisteddfod Officials. Please do NOT enter the area beyond the privacy screens (which is clearly signed) as this area is reserved for Eisteddfod Officials only.
- Please note that beyond the privacy screens, the tea/coffee facilities and food provided is for Eisteddfod Officials only, so please do not help yourself to those items.
- The Green Room has been allocated to drama studios as a changing space only, not a common area, and like all other dressing rooms in the MECC, there is to be NO food or drink whatsoever consumed inside it (other than bottled water).
- The Green Room shall only open to competitors a half an hour prior to each session. ie 8am for the morning session, 12.30pm for the afternoon session and 6pm for the evening session.
- Once their section has commenced, competitors should not be waiting in the Green Room but rather lined up on the marshalling chairs outside the space.
- Finally, please ensure that noise levels in the Green Room (and in the hallway outside) are kept to a minimum.

The Green Room is a shared space with Eisteddfod officials, and all competitors, parents and teachers alike must abide by the rules outlined above. Persons who do not abide by the rules will be asked to leave.

All persons are required to wear closed shoes in all MECC dressing rooms, Green Room, backstage areas/hallways and stage – except for performers who are dressed in their stage costume/outfit.

To be awarded to the competitor (15 to 18 Years) securing the most aggregate points from the following sections: Verse Recitation, Characterization, Shakespearean Recital, Verse or Prose by an Australian Author, Prepared Reading of Prose, Storytelling or Mime.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

THE LUKE VENABLES AGGREGATE TROPHY

To be awarded to the competitor (11 and 12 Years) securing the most aggregate points from the following sections: Characterization or Shakespearean Recital, Verse Recitation or Verse/Prose by an Australian Author, Prepared Reading and Mime.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

ASPIRE PERFORMING ARTS AGGREGATE TROPHY

To be awarded to the competitor (13 and 14 Years) securing the most aggregate points from the following sections: Characterization, Verse Recitation, Verse or Prose by an Australian Author, Shakespearean Recital or Period Drama Solo, Prepared Reading or Mime.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

THE FIONA FLEMING MEMORIAL TROPHY:

To be awarded to the performer (13 years and over) securing the most aggregate points over the following sections: Characterization or Shakespearean Recital, Storytelling or Impromptu Reading, Prepared Reading and Mime.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

THE GROUP SPEAKING CHAMPIONSHIPS (PRIMARY SCHOOLS) TROPHY

To be awarded to the Primary School securing the most aggregate points in any three of the following sections: Prep (Section 474), Year 1 (Section 475), Year 2 (Section 476), Year 3 (Section 477), Year 4 (Section 478), Year 5 (Section 479) or Years 6 (Section 480). If one school has 2 entries within a section, each choir will be considered a separate entity with regards to points.

First Prize \$300.00 Runner-up \$150.00

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

ADJUDICATOR'S CHOICE

THE SO DRAMATIC STUDIO ENCOURAGEMENT TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the competitor in (10 Years and Under) most deserving of encouragement.

The recipient receives a Trophy, Replica and \$50.00

THE LEISA PERSSON ENCOURAGEMENT TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the competitor (11 to 18 Years) most deserving of encouragement.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

THE RAMSAY ENCOURAGEMENT TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the competitor (18 Years and Under) most deserving of encouragement in any Characterization section.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

THE JULIA (GWEN) OXENHAM MEMORIAL SHIELD

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the (solo/duologue) competitor (12 Years and Under) most entertaining performance.

This is a perpetual shield to be competed for annually

THE CREATIVE VIDEO AND EDITING TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the (solo/duologue) competitor (18 Years and Under) most outstanding performance.

This is a perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

THE NANCY HOGAN MEMORIAL SHIELD

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the competitor for the most promising Shakespearian performance.

This is a Perpetual shield to be competed for annually and a Replica will be presented as a memento

HARRY MILLAN MEMORIAL TROPHY:

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most promising performer of Verse or Prose by an Australian Author in Sections 423, 429, 435, 441, 447.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

THE SOPHIE REILLY MIME TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator (18 Years and Under) most promising performance in Mime.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

NYFA AUSTRALIA PERFORMING ARTS AWARD:

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most outstanding performer (13 to 18 Years).

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

THE MOST ENTERTAINING GROUP SPEAKING PERFORMANCE (PRIMARY SCHOOLS) TROPHY

To be awarded by the Adjudicator. Only competitors from Sections 474, 475, 476, 477, 478, 479 & 480 may be considered for this award.

This is a Perpetual trophy to be competed for annually

SAPPHIRE FINANCIAL SERVICES MOST ENTERTAINING JUNIOR GROUP

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most entertaining junior group in the age groups Year 3 & under and Year 6 & Under. To be chosen from the following sections: Dramatic Excerpt, Musical Theatre Excerpt & Mime Group (ie not Choral Speaking sections)

This is a Perpetual shield to be competed for annually

THE JOE CLUTTERBUCK MEMORIAL SHIELD FOR MOST OUTSTANDING JUNIOR GROUP

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most outstanding junior group in the age groups Year 3 & under and Year 6 & Under. To be chosen from the following sections: Dramatic Excerpt, Musical Theatre Excerpt & Mime Group (ie not Choral Speaking sections)

This is a Perpetual shield to be competed for annually

SAPPHIRE FINANCIAL SERVICES MOST ENTERTAINING SENIOR GROUP

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most entertaining senior group in the age groups Year 9 & under and Year 12 & Under. To be chosen from the following sections: Dramatic Excerpt, Musical Theatre Excerpt & Mime Group (ie not Choral Speaking sections)

This is a Perpetual shield to be competed for annually

THE SALLY EALES SHIELD FOR MOST OUTSTANDING SENIOR GROUP

To be awarded by the Adjudicator to the most outstanding senior group in the age groups Year 9 & under and Year 12 & Under. To be chosen from the following sections: Dramatic Excerpt, Musical Theatre Excerpt & Mime Group (ie not Choral Speaking sections)

This is a Perpetual shield to be competed for annually

BURSARIES (In case of a joint winner money will be divided)

THE JOE NORRIS BURSARY

To be awarded to the local competitor (10 Years and Under) who in the opinion of the Adjudicator shows most promise as a performer. The winner will receive **\$200.00**

THE BUTCH BERNET BURSARY

To be awarded to the local competitor (11 to 14 Years) who in the opinion of the Adjudicator shows most promise as a performer. The winner will receive **\$200.00**

THE MACROSSAN AND AMIET SOLICITORS BURSARY

To be awarded to the local competitor (15 to 18 Years) who in the opinion of the Adjudicator shows most promise as a performer. The winner will receive **\$200.00**

* A "wash" is a general "fill" of coloured light across the stage through the use of lighting fixtures using coloured lighting gels. It is important to let the MECC staff know that this will be used as the gels can run out and if they are unaware they may not be available on the day which is important because a number of studios use this on Groups Day.

[^] A cyclorama or cyc is a large white curtain, positioned at the back of the stage area, used for projection or lighting purposes.
